Give one hour for neighborhood safety

At the EEV monthly meeting in November, residents were asked to give just one hour of their busy schedules to assist the volunteer security patrol for the neighborhood. If just one-third of our neighborhood would commit to an hour per month, we would have a 24-hour patrol every day of the year!

Can you book a day to drive? Perhaps every third Tuesday at 7 p.m. or 8 a.m... choose a regular day and time that works for you. Head out with your wife or husband, a neighbor or a friend for some quality time, while touring our beautiful neighborhood. Volunteer drivers are asked to patrol the streets, keeping an

eye out for suspicious activity. Any issues are reported to EEV security, street reps or 911. Drivers are meant to be a deterrent to criminals.

Flashing lights and EEV security magnets are available, but you can drive without them as well. It is important for us to have eyes on the street and keep up communi-

cations with our local precinct.

A sign-up calendar will be available at the EEV Holiday Party and at future meetings, or you can volunteer by calling your street representative. As an incentive for drivers who will commit to an hour per month, \$5 gift cards will be offered for the first 25 new volunteers.

Holiday safety reminder

The Detroit Fire Department encourages residents to use caution with Christmas trees and lights. Here are safety tips to follow:

CHRISTMAS TREES

If you use a natural Christmas tree:

- Make certain that the trunk is sticky with resin and the needles bend as opposed to breaking.
- Keep the tree away from any heat source, such as a heat vent, radiator or fireplace, and out of exit paths.
- Keep your tree full of water and check it daily.
- Avoid trees sprayed with coloring. Don't spray a tree with any product containing chemicals or flammables.
- Trim the lower branches to avoid eye injuries to small children.
- Dispose of your tree quickly after the holidays.
- Avoid the use of candles near combustible decorations, curtains or other flammables.

If you use an artificial tree:

- Only use "off-tree" lighting with aluminum trees.
- Do not use combustible-type materials for decorating.

CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

Observe the following safety tips when using lights:

- Replace strings of lights that have worn or frayed cords.
- Buy only lights that have been tested and carry a seal, such as that of the Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Do not plug more than three sets of lights into one extension cord.
- Replace blown fuses with same size fuses, never with a larger size. Some appliances may have to be turned off or plugged into another outlet on a different circuit to remedy the condition.
- Make sure lights used out-

doors have been approved for that type of use and are waterproof.

- Don't leave the Christmas lights on overnight or when away from home.

People who smoke should also observe safety precautions during the holiday season:

- Smokers should keep smoldering cigarettes and cigar butts away from gift-wrappings and away from Christmas trees, lights and other holiday decorations.
- Smokers should check furniture for fallen ashes and also empty ashtrays into a metal container with a cover or into the toilet.

The Detroit Fire Department does not recommend or encourage the use of kerosene heaters.

Residents who insist on using kerosene space heaters should observe the following safety precautions:

- Use only fuel recommended by the manufacturer.
- Fill the heater outdoors and do not overfill.
- Properly ventilate the room where the heater is located.
- Operate the kerosene heater on a drip pan to contain any spills.
- Place the heater at least 3

feet away from any ordinary combustibles, which include all household furniture.

- Have at least one multi-purpose fire extinguisher nearby.
- Do not place clothes or furniture near the heater.
- Do not leave children alone with heaters or operate heaters in children's sleeping areas.

Residents who use electric space heaters should observe the following safety precautions:

- Use only electric heaters equipped with an auto shut-off and trip-over switch, or a thermostat-controlled model.
- Do not operate electric heaters near combustible materials or flammable liquids.

When using either electric or kerosene heaters, residents should:

- Purchase only UL approved heaters.
- Install approved smoke detectors.
- Read all operating instructions carefully.
- Do not leave the heater unattended or operate while sleeping.

An inspirational neighbor

One of our neighbors in Morningside is truly an inspiring person. Lisa Brancato Mauck lived in East English Village back in 1991 and ended up settling in Morningside in 1992, where she's been ever since. She lives there with her husband Randy and their two children, Addison and Dawson. Detroit is very lucky to have her!

Ms. Mauck is a native Detroiter who grew up on the northwest side. She lived in a loft downtown in the 1980s for about five years, during the time businesses were still leaving the city. This is where her passion for Detroit really began to develop, and it has continued to this day.

Lisa has an extensive resume that includes her work with many of Detroit's finest institutions. This work background has helped to solidify her belief in our city. Two of the most memorable positions for her were working for the Parade Company and the Detroit Zoological Society. As the Director of Development and Sponsorship Services for the Parade Company, Ms. Mauck was responsible for the sales of the sponsorships that help support the Thanksgiving parade and the International Freedom Festival Fireworks. While working at the Detroit Zoo as the marketing manager, she was responsible for special events programs and all fund-raising activities. She had many other duties within each of these organizations, including managing major projects and directing community outreach initiatives. Lisa describes working for these companies

as two of the most memorable for her because, in these types of events, people from all walks of life are working together for a common cause in and around Detroit. She particularly enjoys coordinating volunteer efforts because of the enthusiasm and vibrancy they bring. She says, "Detroit is all about coming together, celebrating, setting aside differences and sharing in the beauty of the jewels of our city." She considers herself blessed to have had many jobs that have allowed her love for the city to flourish.

In her new role as a freelance event planner, Ms. Mauck remains an ambassador for Detroit. This summer, for example, she worked with the Michigan AIDS Coalition on a three-day national event to promote AIDS awareness and raise funds for the organization. This event allowed artists, interior designers, architects and others to come together with AIDS activists, and it was a huge success. It was the first time the city hosted the event, and people were "blown

away" with Detroit's response to such an undertaking. Photographs and a story are scheduled to be featured in the January edition of "Detroit Home."

Like many people, Lisa and her family have been affected by the recent economic woes of this area. In fact, she was interviewed on WDET's Craig Fahle Show, "The New Normal." This program featured stories about how the economic downturn has affected this area's residents. Ms. Mauck was laid off from a position at a non-profit organization and is now doing freelance work, while her husband took a pay cut at his job. A decrease in income caused the family to make some cutbacks. They decided early on to find affordable activities in the area; things they can do that cost little, yet still support city businesses. Because of her strong organizational skills from her work experience, Lisa often organizes low-cost outings with neighbors and friends, such as small theater plays, free concerts, group trips to Eastern Market, etc. Last Christmas, she bought all her Christmas gifts from local artists and found it affordable to do so. Lisa considers it a challenging but fun new way to live.

Ms. Mauck has a strong belief in community activism, but like all of us, she hears a lot of negativity about the city. However, she remains optimistic. "Everyone should do their part," she says. "We should become more aware of what kinds of things are available here that we can support." She is beginning to see some money coming back to the non-profits in the area; people supporting events and causes more than they were a few years ago; lots more young people moving to the city, and many grassroots ambassadors that offer hope.

As for her family, they have created and maintained strong neighborhood ties, which has been a great help. In her neighborhood people help each other, especially in matters of safety. "We call each other if a light has burned out, and it's in a place that maybe the neighbor can't see," Lisa explains. They understand the importance of keeping trees and bushes trimmed for safety, keeping lights on, and generally not being a target. Although there have been some negative changes in recent years, she still considers this a stable, beautiful area and wants to remain in the city. "We're here to stay," she says. "We are not bailing."

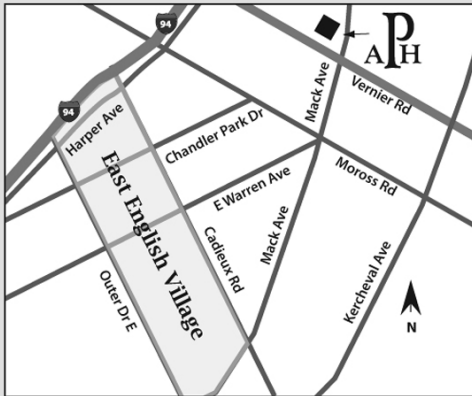
