## Garden Club to plant flowers

The East English Village Garden Club meeting on Sunday, Aug. 21 was full of flavor and fragrance. We enjoyed a presentation by Pat Cardellia and Sue Ternes of the Grosse Pointe Unit of the Herb Society of America. Ms. Cardellia and Ms. Ternes shared some of the characteristics, history and culture of various herbs, as well as practical tips on growing and caring for the herbs. We learned that parsley may attract Monarch butterflies; flowers from basil and chives can be used to add flavor and dress up your salads. Our speakers and members also brought examples of herbs to "sample" by smell and taste. We tried watercress, which is pungent, and stevia, surpris-

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# Be the eyes and ears of your neighborhood



If you have found yourself in a situation where you witness a crime taking place or have been a victim of a crime, please be proactive and take the following steps:

- Call the police at 911

• Call your street rep, your block captain, and security (names are in the newsletter)

• Call our HOTLINE to report any suspicious activity at (313) 216-1729. Give as much information as

possible: Physical descriptions of the car, the people, and license plate number. Take photos if possible.

• Be a presence outside to possibly thwart further action by the criminals.

• Keep your front porch light and motion sensors on at all times.

• Volunteer with our driving patrol

• Subscribe to our paid security - the more who participate, the more hours they are on patrol.

• Know your neighbors and watch out for each other.

These actions truly make a difference in the timeliness and efficacy of response to a crime. For example, last fall, a neighbor on Grayton complained that strangers in an unmarked white van were taking items (leaded glass windows, solid oak doors, etc) out of a vacant house. The street rep was called and within a few minutes, several security patrol drivers with flashing lights visited the house and talked to the people entering the house. The police also quickly came, since both the resident and the neighborhood administration called the police department.

This is one of many examples of the multi-faceted reporting system (911, hotline, street rep/block captain) working for EEV. This proactive, multi-faceted approach to reporting criminal activity is our best tool for keeping our neighborhood a safe, peaceful place.

# Volunteer Car Patrol

East English Village (EEV) has a paid security car service, however, we also have our own volunteer group. The EEV Volunteer Car Patrol supplements the paid security car service. A number of residents drive or bike through our neighborhood blocks, being the observant good neighbor.

At our August 10 monthly EEV meeting, EEV President Bill Barlage told us how Harvard Street Representative Joe

Balistreri's bike drive-bys interrupted a recent home break-in. Also, that the Detroit Police Department and active community involve-



ment have helped in the capture of copper thieves in our area.

In updating our car patrol schedule, I was reminded how many people it takes to make our patrolling more comprehensive. We have a number of time slots open where another "set of vigilant eyes" would be most helpful. Volunteers commit to a time that is best for them, then drive through our EEV streets noting any suspicious ac-

tions or just looking at the beautiful homes and landscaping. Our neighborhood has such beautiful homes and gardens that it's easy to get ideas on thing to do with our own homes.

## Recycling continues despite budget cuts

Detroit remains committed to curbside recycling according to Ron Brundidge, Director, Department of

Public Works. Mayor Dave Bing's 2011-12 proposed budget for curbside recycling is less than half this year's figure — which was

only 44% of the initial 2009 start-up allocation.

About 28,000 households in East and West Detroit had curbside service in 2010. On average, 28% of the residents in these areas collectively recycled 98.5 tons per month.

In May 2011, with household occupancy in the pilot areas down to 24,872, 35% of the residents recycled 70 tons.

East English Village residents have been excited about curbside recycling; it has been one more of the many attractive features bringing new neighbors, thinking citizens.

Make sure you recycle as much as you can. Recyclable items – newspaper, cardboard including all packing materials, metals and plastics – often are larger than the recycle bin. No problem. Place them along side and our cooperative city workers are picking up the items. There is talk of introduc-

ing a recycling program as part of school programs in our neighborhood which would help too. Children's support can make the difference between a house recycling and not recycling.

Sadly, the city will not support another Household Hazardous Waste Drop-off Day this year. We look forward to next Earth Day for the next Drop-off Day in East English Village.

## Fall activities: Tutoring, mentoring and sports

Eagle Sports Club's website states, "ESC is a Christian-based organization that is working with children and families to revitalize neighborhoods, restore parks, and encourage spiritual survival." Their mission is "to build life-changing relationships through sports, camps, and tutoring."

One of ESC's programs, called SOAR, offers low-cost tutoring in reading for grades 1-8 students. This individualized instruction takes place at Grace Commu-

nity Church. It is offered twice weekly and costs \$25 per month. You may register your child for Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday tutoring, and sessions are held from 4:30-5:30 p.m. or from 5:30-6:30 p.m. Students will be given a reading test to determine eligibility. Now in its fifth year, SOAR has seen some remarkable results, with an average reading improvement of over two levels in one year!

Perhaps you have one hour per week during the school year to spare? You

could tutor a struggling reader, and SOAR could use your help. You do have to attend a training session, which lasts an hour and a half, to become a SOAR mentor. Many dates in September are offered for this training, so it should be easy to fit with your schedule.

Eagle Sports Club is also offering fall soccer for ages 4-14 and flag football for ages 7-14. Registration is taking place now. The league runs from Sept. 24 to Oct. 29. All games take place on Saturdays at Balduck

Park. The \$35 league fee includes a soccer uniform (jersey and socks) or a football jersey for flag football. Hurry! After Sept. 16 the league fee changes to \$50.

For both the sports and tutoring programs, you may stop by Grace Community Church, 21001 Moross between 10 a.m.-4 p.m. You can print out the registration forms ahead of time from their website, [www.eaglesportsclub.com](http://www.eaglesportsclub.com). To become a SOAR mentor, you may register online at the same web address.

# DPD works to reduce calls for false alarms

The Detroit Police Department has implemented a new practice, "verification response," which went into effect in August.

More than 98 percent of the alarms that Detroit Police Department officers respond to are false. Because of this, DPD now will require a "verified response" from alarm companies before sending officers to the location, said Chief Ralph L. Godbee, Jr.

A verified response means that an alarm company must verify that a burglar or break-in alarm is one of the 2 percent of true alarms before contacting DPD. Once the alarm company verifies the alarm, DPD will dispatch officers to the location. DPD reviewed calls for service and determined that false alarms have the greatest financial and staffing impact of any class of calls. As more and more cities and police

departments face limited resources and budget cuts, a logical area of reduction is unproductive calls for service. Alarm responses are consistently 98 percent false nationally.

Verification of burglar alarms ensures police officers are dispatched to true crimes, emergencies, and reports of suspicious behavior. Benefits of verified response include:

- Significant time savings for police, allowing more time for preventative policing activities (such as visibility on patrol and community relations);
- Freeing police officers to respond to higher priority emergency calls;
- Reduction of calls to the 911 system, improving operator availability and answer time.

A report published by the United States Department of Justice recognized verified

response as a best practice toward eliminating waste and improving police service. Since 1991, some 30 police departments in the United States and Canada have adopted verified response and proven its effectiveness. Research has showed that initial concerns expressed by citizens and the alarm industry that burglary rates would spike as a result were unwarranted. Data from cities requiring a verified response before dispatching officers shows no clear trend for an increase in burglaries after implementation. Many police departments require alarm companies to verify alarms before dispatching officers. The Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department first implemented verified response in 1991. They continue to practice it today, and many other departments have followed their lead.

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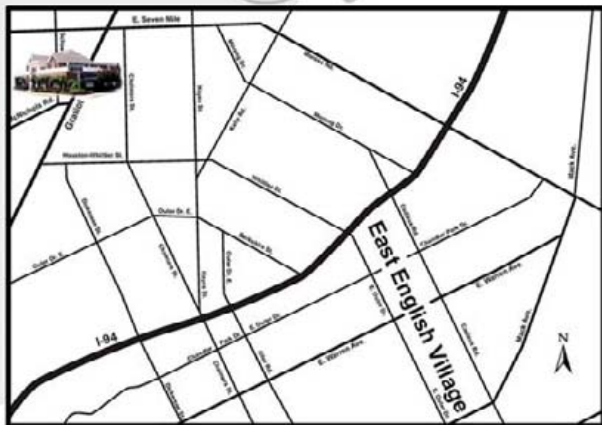
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
